Keddleſton-houſe, the ſplendid ſeat of lord Scarſdale, which is in the immediate neighbourhood of this town, is well worthy the attention of every traveller. It is indeed a moſt ſuperb pile of building, where no expence has been ſpared to attain the higheſt degree of external and internal decoration. The Egyptian hall is one of the nobleſt and moſt magnificent rooms in Europe, and all its ornaments are adapted with ſo much judgment, and finiſhed in ſuch exquisite taſte, that the whole forms a ſcene of genuine edificial grandeur. The roof of this ſplendid room is ſupported by a great number of Corinthian columns of Derbyſhire marble, moſt beautifully variegated. Theſe are fluted, and, being contracted with their high-wrought capitals, which are of pure ſtatuary marble, afford the moſt ſtriking ſpectacle of ſolid beauty which we have ever ſeen in any houſe or palace in any country. All the apartments are truly noble, the furniture of uncommon coſt, and many of the rooms adorned with the moſt capital paintings of the moſt eminent maſters.
